

# Classical Studies Minor Course Offerings Fall 2017

Art History 385/Anthropology 352 –
Art & Archaeology of the Classical World
Dr. Downing TUTH 11:00-12:15
Required for Classical Studies Minor
Cross-listed as ANTH 352

This class provides an introduction to the Classical world through an examination of the archaeological excavations that uncovered the art, architecture, and other artifacts of ancient Greece and Rome. We will begin with the Bronze Age of Greece, and will conclude by examining the political, social, and religious upheavals of the late Roman Empire.

Drama 312 – History of Theatre I - WC

Counts toward Classical Studies Minor
For Theatre Majors/Minors

History of the Theatre I is an upper division critical reading, research and inquiry-based course that explores the multiple and varied expressions of theatrical performance starting with theories of the earliest ritual dramas. We will study theater from its artistic, historical, cultural and political perspectives. The first half of the semester will be spent studying the western theatre traditions of Greece and Rome-- practitioners, plays, & theatre architecture. The second half will investigate how this tradition influenced later forms in the Medieval and early Renaissance periods in Europe. Additionally, our point of view will expand from Europe as we study and compare the performance traditions and read the plays from India's Sanskrit Drama, and Japan's Noh Theatre.

History 322 – Ancient Middle East Dr. Stannish TUTH 12:30-1:45 Minimum requirement of Sophomore standing

Examines the Middle East from 3100 to 322 BC. It is divided into three parts: (1) Mesopotamia; (2) Egypt; (3) the Holy Land. It presents the region's political and cultural traditions through primary and secondary sources.

#### History 480 – Seminar: Ancient Mediterranean - WI

Pre-requisites: HIST 302 or HIST 321 or HIST 322 or HIST 323 or HIST 462 or HIST 463 or HIST 326

Minimum requirement of Sophomore standing

History majors only. Prerequisites or instructor permission is required.

Counts toward Classical Studies Minor.

Capstone course for the History Major. Students design and conduct a significant research project and draft a significant research paper on a topic in Mediterranean history between 1500 BC and AD 500.

### Latin 101 – Elementary College Latin I

MWF 12:00-12:50 Dr. Hudak

Counts toward Classical Studies Minor

Students will learn to read classical Latin passages. The selections will be a medium by which historical events and social aspects of the period can be examined. The course will introduce the basics of Latin grammar and its influence on the development of other languages. Students will come to appreciate how Latin is 'alive and well' in the extensive etymological roots of English vocabulary..

#### Latin 102 – Elementary College Latin II

Prerequisite: LATN 101 or permission Counts toward Classical Studies Minor

This course will build upon the bases of the Latin language learned in Latin 101 (or equivalent) and introduce further grammatical constructions and other syntactical constructions necessary for developing a reading knowledge of Latin. The cultural content will focus on Britain and Alexandria during the first century AD during the Pax Romana. Students will examine, through the readings with a rural Romano-British background and a cosmopolitan Alexandrian setting, the various provincial aspects of Roman life of both the conquered and the conquerors in various social and economic positions. Relevant study of some archeology, epigraphy, and the historical events from this time period will be incorporated, as well as other influences of the Romans and the Latin language upon our cultural heritage.

#### Literature 371 – Classical Heritage – WI, AC

TTH 9:30-10:45

Prerequisite: FW or equivalent. Counts as World Literature credit and Pre-1900 credit.

Counts toward Classical Studies Minor

This course will examine Greek and Roman literature and major works from later periods influenced by this tradition. Several different literary approaches will be applied to the primary texts in class.





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## **Classical Studies Minor**

The minor in Classical Studies is an interdisciplinary program of studies intended to encourage undergraduates in various disciplines to come to an integrated awareness of the ancient cultures of Greece, Rome, and the Mediterranean, and of the classical tradition that underlies much of modern civilization. Courses are offered in six different departments, from across the School of Arts and Sciences.
