

Constitution Day, is an American federal observance that recognizes the adoption of the United States Constitution and those who have become U.S. citizens. It is normally observed on September 17, the day in 1787 that delegates to the Constitutional Convention signed the document in Philadelphia.

This year, the celebration of Constitution Day was sponsored by the Student History Association and the Lougheed Learning Commons. Since September 17th fell on a Saturday this year, the celebration was held on Friday, September 16th, in Lougheed Learning Commons from 11:00 am until 2:00 pm.

Pamphlets were available that explained fascinating facts about the United States Constitution. Students could also vote on the favorite amendment and win a chance for a \$25 PACES gift certificate.

Eve voted for the 19th amendment, which says:

"The Nineteenth Amendment to the United States
Constitution prohibits the United States and its states from
denying the right to vote to citizens of the United States on the
basis of sex, in effect recognizing the right of women to a vote.
The amendment was the culmination of a decades-long movement for women's suffrage in the United States, at both the state
and national levels, and was part of the worldwide movement
towards women's suffrage and part of the wider women's rights
movement. The first women's suffrage amendment was introduced in Congress in 1878. However, a suffrage amendment did
not pass the House of Representatives until May 21, 1919, which
was quickly followed by the Senate, on June 4, 1919. It was then
submitted to the states for ratification, achieving the requisite 36
ratifications to secure adoption, and thereby go into effect, on
August 18, 1920."

Orange Shirt Day (September 30th) is the National Day for truth and Reconciliation to honor the thousands of indigenous children who were forcefully removed from their families and communities to attend residential schools in North America. The orange shirts reference the real orange shirt taken from Phyllis Webstad, the Founder and Ambassador of the Orange Shirt Society, on her first day at a church-run residential school in 1973.

The SUNY Potsdam Student History Association assisted in the event to commemorate Orange Shirt Day on September 30, 2022. The event started on Wednesday, 9/28/22, as the students, faculty, and staff placed 10,000 orange flags—one for each indigenous student at the Carlisle School in Pennsylvania, 1879-1918 in the academic quad. This was an extremely emotional event for students, faculty, and staff.

The students who volunteered to help oversee this event received an orange T-shirt that was designed by Taylor Francis, a SUNY Potsdam Art Education alumna who is a Mohawk from Mohawk Territory of Akwesasne, which is located on the international border between Canada and the United States.

Alumni News



Congratulations Naj, and all the best in your summer studies!



SUNY Scholar Participates in Federal Grant to Revise History Curriculum



SUNY Potsdam faculty members
Dr. Thomas Baker and Dr. Gaylynn Welch
recently joined 14 other SUNY scholars and two visiting scholars in the Adirondacks, as part of a National
Endowment for the Humanities grant to reimagine
the U.S. history curriculum across the SUNY system.

The weeklong workshop focused on the late 19th century period often described as the Gilded Age and Progressive Era. The project's goals include developing new courses within SUNY and revising existing courses to better reflect the current state of the field. The project will also produce a book and companion website designed to help teachers, community college instructors and college professors incorporate recent scholarship and best teaching practices into their courses.

In the second year of the grant, participating faculty will develop outreach efforts to local school districts across New York State. They will provide professional development opportunities for middle and high school social studies teachers. "It was great to be able to get together with fellow historians from SUNY campuses to brainstorm about course redesign," Baker said. "The Adirondack lake setting was lovely, too!" "This was a wonderful workshop! Both the conversations and atmosphere were rejuvenating. It was great to discuss and debate different approaches to teaching the Gilded and Progressive Era while stay-ing at one of the historical Adirondack 'Great Camps,'" Welch said.
