News from the Department...

The State University of New York at Potsdam is proud to announce its first fully online baccalaureate program: a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science. The program is the first to be offered 100 percent virtually in the field in the SUNY System. The program will kick off in Fall 2023, and faculty have been hard at work preparing courses and preparing the applied learning experiences for the first cohort of fully online students. All coursework can be completed asynchronously, so students can work on their own schedules.

Students will be able to take advantage of applied learning opportunities like internships, service projects, study abroad and career services support as well. They can even take part in real-world research projects. The Lougheed Center for Applied Learning is available to support our online majors in finding internship placements wherever they are located, from legal fields to international affairs.

Online students will also be able to take advantage of the department's career-ready joint programs. The 3+3 BA/JD program with the University at Buffalo School of Law allows students to complete an accelerated course of study and complete both their undergraduate education and their law degree in just six years total (instead of the seven years it would typically take).

The department also has joint programs with the University at Albany's Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy, allowing motivated undergraduates to go straight from their undergraduate studies in political science into either Rockefeller's Master of International Affairs (MIA) or Master of Public Administration (MPA) programs. Both options allow eligible undergraduates to enroll at UAlbany early, without taking the GRE—saving a semester of coursework and tuition and fees.

SUNY Potsdam Students in Dr. Robert Hinckley's Lab Lead National Survey on Impact of COVID on Public

A group of hard-working SUNY Potsdam undergraduates are spending the next few months conducting a national sample survey on the impact of COVID on public opinion. Led by Dr. Robert Hinckley, an associate professor and chair of SUNY Potsdam's Department of Politics, the students are earning academic credit and valuable firsthand experience in public opinion research.

The students range from freshmen to seniors and come from different academic majors, but all are working together on the ongoing survey project. The project has been funded through the College's Kilmer Labs program, which funds faculty-led research with students.

"The students and I have decided to focus on identifying lasting effects of the COVID pandemic on public opinion," Hinckley said. "We plan future press releases and academic presentations of the resulting data."

The student research team includes:

The SUNY Potsdam research team is utilizing a standing online panel approach to their survey, using a contract through Qualtrics. This allows the group to build a nationally representative panel from approximately 1,500 respondents.

"The online panel is the cutting edge of sampling designs since most people will not answer their landline or mobile phone when they don't recognize the number," Hinckley said. "Surveys have become commonplace in our society, but response rates have gone down dramatically. These students will learn the common pitfalls and how to avoid them. They will also build valuable skills in data analysis and the communication of survey results."

Hinckley has plenty of experience in polling to share with the students, having led public opinion surveys for numerous regional municipalities over the past decade. The new approach will allow him to share the latest best practices with his students and the next generation of researchers—and to share the resulting information with the public.

The Kilmer Labs program is sponsored by SUNY Potsdam's Lougheed Center for Applied Learning, with support from the Kilmer Fund, which was established by an anonymous donor to honor Dr. Frederick Barnett Kilmer, a physician and analytical chemist, who was the director of scientific affairs for the Johnson & Johnson Company from 1889 to 1934.


"Kilmer Labs is an initiative to expand research opportunities for undergraduates by supporting faculty research 'lab' projects (usually team-based in format). Faculty members agree to sponsor and employ a certain number of student research assistants over the term of the grant," said Dr. Tom Baker, associate director of the Lougheed Center for Applied Learning. "The 'labs' in question can take many forms, depending on the nature of the research project. Pilot projects include labs in special education, environmental studies, politics, and at the cross-section of music and human performance. The aim is to provide students with high-impact research experiences under the guidance of faculty mentors. The program also has the collateral benefit of supporting our faculty members' research agendas."

Through the Presidential Scholars Program, motivated & talented SUNY Potsdam students are given the opportunity to create their own independent project and to more fully develop their interests and intellect.

The Presidential Scholar's Program provides recognition and additional financial resources to students who have achieved academic excellence and who demonstrate a commitment to their own academic progress. Students selected for the program are required to draft an educational plan and complete a project that will lead to fulfillment of their academic goals. Presidential Scholars are supported in the design and implementation of their project by individual faculty mentors. Students who wish to explore possibilities beyond the limits of traditional classroom experiences are strongly encouraged to apply to the Program.

Title: The Economic Indignations of Authoritarian Populism In liberal democracies worldwide, an increasing percentage of those with socially conservative attitudes are supporting politicians disseminating populist rhetoric and authoritarian values. In the book Cultural Backlash: Trump, Brexit, and Authoritarian Populism, Norris and Inglehart argue that grievances pertaining to economic issues, such as globalization, often reiterate a perception of societal changes as threatening amongst the socially conservative. These grievances motivate them to support authoritarian populist politicians who appeal to their economic concerns (18). To what extent do economic grievances motivate socially conservative populations to support authoritarian populist parties and politicians in liberal democracies globally? Where do economic grievances rank amongst the variables that contribute to their support for these parties and politicians? The intention of this project is to measure the extent to which economic grievances influence social conservatives' support for authoritarian populist parties and politicians. To achieve these intentions, the project will conduct a comparative analysis. This project will compare individual countries around the world that are experiencing a surge in authoritarian populist sentiment using data from various sources, such as the World Values Survey, to reveal the similarities and differences between them. These similarities and differences identify relevant variables that may contribute to socially conservative populations' increasing support of authoritarian populists. The project will compare the presence and magnitude of several variables, including economic grievances, among several different cases. This project builds upon the work of sociologists and political scientists such as Seymour Lipset, Daniel Bell, Pippa Norris, and Ronald Inglehart. It expands on their research on topics such as modernization, democratization, authoritarianism, and populism. Specifically, the premise of this project is rooted in Seymour Lipset's economic theory of democratic development and Ronald Inglehart's generational replacement theory (134).
