Notes from Academic Affairs

I want to first of all acknowledge what I know has been an incredibly difficult and painful week for you, your colleagues, and our students. Our nation's deep roots of social and racial injustice are clearly displayed through the trial of Derek Chauvin; COVID cases and new variants are rising amid what can best be described as pandemic fatigue, which appears to be fueling a fourth surge; and painful and very personal issues here at home related to sexual assault, gender-based violence, microaggressions, and bias have led to critically important discussions and calls for reform.

This Newsletter includes specific resources related to Title IX, gender-based violence, and sexual assault (pages 2-7) that have been gathered by our campus community. And please don't forget about this week's *Days of Reflection* (see page 8 for more details), which includes a specific session today (**April 12th at 5:00pm**) on "The Triple Trauma of Sexual and Gender-Based Violence: Race, Gender, Higher Education" facilitated by Interim Chief Diversity Officer *Claudia Ford*. As has been emailed recently to campus, we have also seen an increase in COVID positive cases among our students, and therefore have had to reinstate restrictions related to dining, social gatherings, and use of the fitness center. However, it is important to note that face-to-face classes are proceeding as planned, and students do still have access to the Loughheed Learning Commons, rehearsal spaces, studios, and labs. Please keep in mind that, due to the large numbers of students who are now impacted, it is not possible for staff to contact each student's faculty member when a student is required to go into isolation or quarantine. However, if desired, faculty can ask students for their isolation/quarantine orders that they would have received from Public Health. Thank you in advance for being as flexible as possible with our students, many of whom are feeling very isolated by this pandemic. **It is also incredibly important for those who are teaching face-to-face to keep seating charts for every class session.** Without updated seating charts, entire classes are required to be placed in quarantine because accurate contact tracing cannot be completed. We will continue to assess our campus'

cases each week, with the hope that restrictions can again be lifted. As a reminder, updates are provided on our campus' [Potsdam Prepared](#) website.

I also recognize that there is still a lot of uncertainty around our fall schedule. Right now, we are anticipating that we will be following the [academic calendar](#) as published, including planned breaks. Our campus is focused on welcoming students in the fall to as much of a “normal,” face-to-face college experience as possible. However, there are many details that will still need to be worked out—including whether or not the current six-foot social distancing guidelines will still be in effect, which will significantly impact our availability of classroom spaces. The great news is that all adults in New York are now eligible for the vaccine! This allows plenty of time for our students, and our faculty/staff, to become fully vaccinated long before the start of the fall semester. (At this point in time, vaccines are not a requirement for SUNY students or employees, but we are monitoring this closely.) I continue to work closely with the Cabinet, Academic Affairs Continuity Working Group, Faculty Senate leadership, Council of Chairs and Program Directors, and Emergency Resource Response Group to monitor and communicate any changes to policies and guidelines at the state/SUNY level and to gather input, concerns, and suggestions across Academic Affairs. I deeply appreciate your patience, understand your frustration with the reality of our current uncertainties, and look forward to having all of our students and employees back on our vibrant campus as soon as it is safe to do so!

Again, please know that I am thinking of you and your students. Thank you for the support and advocacy that you are providing to each other and our campus community. Also, please don't forget to take care of yourself. Remember, if you need support in these challenging times, don't hesitate to contact the [College Counseling Center](#) (for students) or take advantage of the Mental Health Resources team in Microsoft Teams (for employees). LGBTQ+ Resources. The Division of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion would like to make sure that members of the Potsdam community are aware of campus resources specifically dedicated to LGBTQ+ issues. Please be sure to pass along this information to your students and colleagues.

The *Office for Gender and Sexuality* was created to provide services and resources for the LGBTQ+ community as well as educational programming for the broader campus community. These services and resources are designed to improve the experience of members of the LGBTQ+ community at SUNY Potsdam, and to promote a more inclusive campus community for all. To achieve these goals, the Gender and Sexuality Co-Coordinators, *Michael Popović* and *Cailey Underhill*, have designed a number of support services and educational resources such as a series of trainings related to LGBTQ+ topics, an on-campus support group for LGBTQ+ students, and the creation of our annual Lavender Graduation.

The Office for Gender and Sexuality actively collaborates with the Health Center and the Counseling Center, and helped to design the Preferred Name Policy. Student Health Services provides comprehensive transgender healthcare to students. Because the needs of the LGBTQ+ community on campus include more than naming policies and mental and physical health services, the Office for Gender and Sexuality also provides the following resources:

Gender and Sexuality Workshops and Trainings

The Office has developed a number of presentations and interactive workshops that can be tailored to your group, areas of interest, ages of participants, and desired learning outcomes. Topics that are covered include basic terms and labels, pronouns, models for understanding gender and sexuality, transgender and gender non-conforming identities, LGBTQ+ history, intersectionality, allyship, and more.

LGBTQ+ Support Group

In response to the unique challenges that members of the LGBTQ+ population face, in addition to the general difficulties presented by the pandemic, the Office has partnered with the Counseling Center to create an LGBTQ+ Support Group. The group is designed by the students who wish to participate in the meetings to ensure that the needs of students are being met most effectively. Any student who identifies as part of the LGBTQ+ community is welcome to attend. Meetings are held twice a month on Wednesdays from 7:00-8:00 p.m. Due to restrictions around COVID-19, the meetings are held via Zoom. Later this month, the Office will launch a comprehensive webpage that addresses a wide range of topics related to the LGBTQ+ community. Days of Reflection. SUNY Potsdam's *Spring 2021 Days of Reflection* is taking place this week, from **April 12th to 15th** and offers a variety of virtual sessions on important topics including racial and health inequities, bilingualism, the n-word, racial incidents on campus, student conversations about race, and student activism. I am deeply grateful to the many students, faculty, and staff who will present sessions, and for everyone involved in the planning of this important campus-wide event.

Student Survey Reminder. I am writing to ask for your assistance in encouraging your students to participate in the *2021 Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS)*. This survey is extremely important to our campus, as it will provide insight into students' experiences at SUNY Potsdam. We will use the results of the survey to highlight our strengths and to identify areas that need improvement or further attention. This is the eleventh System-wide administration of this survey over the past thirty years and all of SUNY's state-operated campuses are participating. On April 12th, students will receive an email from "SUNY Survey <survey@suny.edu>" inviting them to participate in this important survey.

We have always found that we get the best response from the first email request, but students will receive an additional three reminders throughout the month following survey launch. The survey takes approximately 25 minutes to complete. I appreciate your help in informing students of this survey and encouraging their participation.

Textbook Services. The College Store has recently announced that significant changes are being introduced related to their textbook business, starting with Summer Session 2021. The College Store has partnered with the largest textbook supplier in the nation, BNC Services. They currently serve the needs of nearly half a million students nationwide, with over 7 million books in their Columbia, Missouri facility. BNC Services was developed to help institutions like ours improve textbook services. The BNC Services program ensures course materials will be available when academic terms begin. This program provides convenient ordering, accurate and timely fulfillment, and better overall services for our students. Additional benefits include:

- BNC Services maintains a current list of our courses and materials, and in the event of any changes, they promptly notify students.
- Students may sell back their textbooks to BNC Services using a convenient online buyback option.
- Students may access the online Virtual Bookstore 24/7 at:

- Orders are shipped via UPS from BNC Services within 24 hours (excluding weekends and holidays).

With this change, the College Store will no longer carry textbooks here on campus. The only course materials that will be carried will be on-campus printing such as lab books. Textbooks must be ordered and will be shipped directly to the student or to the College Store where the student can pick up their order.

A portal will be developed for faculty to use to place their requisitions, which should be available to faculty in the fall for Spring, 2022. Until the portal has been established, requisitions will be submitted by email to *Janet Robbins* at robbinjl@potsdam.edu using the spreadsheet provided in a previous email. The College Store will submit the requisitions to BNC Services. All the same versions of textbooks will be available as in the past including new, used, rental, digital, Inclusive Access, and OER.

Potsdam@RCF. Potsdam is preparing to welcome its freshmen class of 34 students this fall at Riverview Correctional Facility (RCF) in Ogdensburg. The Bachelor of Arts program at RCF will offer a major in sociology and a minor in human services, completed in four years. The students will be men incarcerated at RCF, a medium-security New York State prison. Students selected for the program will qualify for Second Chance Pell funding. *Potsdam @RCF* is a joint venture with our correctional partner, RCF, and with St. Lawrence University (SLU). Courses will be delivered at RCF by SUNY Potsdam and SLU faculty inside prison classrooms.

We are looking for Potsdam faculty who want to get involved with this program in order to offer courses from across a breadth of disciplines that our campus provides. We are especially interested in faculty who can teach WAYS and Pathways courses.

SUNY Student Emergency Fund (SEF). The SUNY SEF supports students who experience emergencies that might otherwise cause them to stop out of their degree program. To be eligible, a student must:

- Be an undergraduate enrolled in at least six credits;
- Have a minimum 2.0 GPA and be in otherwise good standing with the College; and
- Hold US citizenship, permanent residency, or DACA status (undocumented students are eligible).

An emergency is defined as an unforeseen event or unexpected need for funds, not a chronic problem or anticipated expense. Examples include: homelessness or threat of eviction, medical emergency, natural disaster, domestic violence, theft, or loss of employment. Eligible expenses include (must be paid to a third party): rent, utility bills, clothing, furniture, medical expenses, back-up childcare, back-up transportation, replacement of stolen school supplies. Non-eligible expenses include tuition, textbooks, credit card debt, and legal representation. Potsdam Student Care Fund (SCF). The Potsdam SCF supports both undergraduate and graduate students with emergency needs. Funds are intended to support degree completion and helping students avoid stopping out due to issues that could be resolved with a small amount of financial assistance. Starfish Implementation Update. A team of campus stakeholders continues to work on the implementation of the Starfish software advising/retention platform with a goal of full campus-

wide functionality for the start of the Fall, 2021 term. Advising for Summer, 2021 Orientation is planned to be the last use of our former system, Navigate. To provide continuity between platforms, the conversion will include the importation of historical Navigate appointment report data and notes into Starfish. Starfish training materials and workshops will be made available in August and September to ensure members of the campus community are prepared to use the new system at the start of the academic year.

Potsdam Pathways

Potsdam Pathways Curriculum Committee (PPCC). Elections for positions on the Potsdam Pathways Curriculum Committee (PPCC) are coming up soon. PPCC positions are for a three-year term to run from August, 2021 to May, 2024. Interested faculty may nominate or self-nominate, although the Pathways Director will confirm with nominees before including those names on the ballot. Responsibilities as designator liaison include reviewing syllabi for your designator as well as working as a secondary reviewer on another designator. Reviewed syllabi are then presented by liaisons to the PPCC as a whole for voting/approval. PPCC meetings are generally every other week, on Wednesday afternoons. We are especially looking for a liaison for Thinking Scientifically—Social World (SW). Nominations should be submitted to *Christine Doran*, Interim Director of Pathways (dorancm@potsdam.edu) or to *Kailey Mahar*, Assistant Director of Pathways (maharks@potsdam.edu). Questions should also be directed to Christine or Kailey.

Summer Updates. Assistant Director *Kailey Mahar* has sent out the first 200 surveys for incoming first-year students, with more going out regularly as students deposit. These surveys ask students to select their preferred WAYS 101 course and are an important part of the summer on-boarding process. Almost 25 students instantly responded, eager to begin their careers at SUNY Potsdam. There are 43 sections of WAYS courses planned for the fall with 36 faculty from across SUNY Potsdam who are participating. Arts and Sciences is most heavily represented, and our thanks go out to those faculty for their continued investment in WAYS. However, we are also very pleased to report that we have an increased number of faculty from the other Schools than ever, and the breadth of offerings is fabulous. A huge thank you to all faculty members who are supporting our WAYS courses!

Health & Wellness in the Age of COVID. The *SUNY Distinguished Academy Inaugural Webinar*, titled “Health and Wellness in the Age of COVID: A Call to Action for Higher Education,” will be held on **Thursday, April 15, from 3:00-5:00pm**. Everyone is invited to attend.

This webinar will showcase how wellness and lifestyle medicine can promote the sustainability of SUNY students, staff, faculty, and community especially when external challenges, like COVID-19, have had a disproportionate impact on people of color, and individuals with chronic, underlying disease. Presenters will identify the components of lifestyle medicine that contribute to healthy longevity, namely healthy eating, physical activity, restorative sleep, stress management, positive social connections, and avoidance of risky substances. 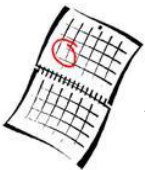

In Case You Missed It

Spring, 2021 COVID Updates. Thank you for all that you continue to do to support our students through this ongoing health pandemic. The close collaboration between Academic Affairs and Student Affairs has allowed our campus to successfully implement face-to-face academic opportunities. However, we need your continued assistance.

- **Contact Information-** When an individual tests positive for COVID-19, Student Health Services immediately initiates contact tracing to identify individuals who may be at risk. It is important to note that the name of the positive individual cannot be disclosed to instructors for privacy reasons. In order to facilitate the contract tracing process, **we ask**

that you please update your contact information with Human Resources as soon as possible. We are finding that records are outdated or do not have complete information.

To ensure that your contact information is correct, follow these steps:

- Log in to the SUNY HR portal at <https://www.suny.edu/time>.
 - Go to "SUNY HR Self-Service."
 - Click on "Phone."
 - If your information is incorrect, click "Select" next to the incorrect phone number, then click "Update."
 - If your information is not in the system, click "Select" next to the correct blank field (cell phone, home phone or another phone), then click "Add."
 - Fill out the form and submit.
 - If you are having trouble, simply contact Human Resources at (315) 267-4816.
- ***Rave Alert-*** Please also check your emergency contact information in the College's emergency alert system, [Potsdam Rave Alert](#). This system is used to notify campus quickly of weather emergencies, as well as important alerts related to the pandemic:
 - Go to <https://rave.potsdam.edu>.
 - Log in with your SUNY Potsdam email account and password.
 - Confirm your contact information.
 - You can add up to two additional email addresses, three cell phone numbers, and three landline phone numbers (**Tip:** Try using one of your additional phone numbers to add contact information for a close family member, so that they can be aware of campus alerts as well!).
 - ***Answering Your Phone-*** We know that spam calls are on the rise, but if you unexpectedly receive a call from a campus number (315-267-xxxx) or a 518-area code number, please answer, as this could be a contact tracer trying to get in touch with you. Student Health Services will reach out to you first to gather information and then will share it with Public Health. The 518-area code number is most likely someone from Department of Public Health, as they will also reach out to individuals.
 - ***Information for Contact Tracing-*** For faculty members who are teaching a face-to-face course (including labs) or a small group vocal or instrument instruction, review sessions, etc., it is critically important to have the following information readily available. Not having this information readily available delays the contract tracing process and could cause further spread of COVID-19.
 - Take attendance for every face-to-face interaction.

- Create a seating chart to include the following information:
 - Room location (name of building and room number);
 - Location of individuals in room (it is helpful to keep individuals in a consistent place each time you meet); and
 - Distance between individuals.
- Make a note of the activities that occurred.
- Ensure date, start time, and end time are listed on the documentation.
- Keep the above information readily available to ensure you can quickly email it to Student Health Services if contacted by a contact tracer.

Please note: *When a class seating chart is not provided to Health Services, it results in requiring that ALL students in that class go into quarantine, which is extremely disruptive to our students' academic progress.* Thank you in advance for having the information above available, including updated seating charts, if/when contact tracing is necessitated.

Accommodative Services Test/Quiz Scheduling. As a reminder, any instructor who has a student wishing to take a paper quiz/test in the Accommodative Service Office should encourage that student to complete the online request form at least two days before the scheduled quiz/test. The instructor will then receive an email regarding that student's scheduling information and a link to an online form requiring instructor approval. Please complete this electronic exam scheduling form as quickly as possible.

If your quizzes/tests are administered on Moodle, there is no reason for the student to schedule their exam with the Accommodative Services Office. Questions? Contact aso@potdam.edu.

Once the migration has been completed, access will be removed from your personal share on Helios. If you find that something has not migrated to OneDrive correctly, please let us know as soon as possible. We do not expect this to be an issue, however it is still best that you verify that all your files have been transferred correctly.
