Group Tutoring is specifically focused on academic skill development and improving student outcomes in specific courses.

The survey will consist of a brief series of Likert scale and short answer questions, eachof which will relate to our two SLOs.  Responses on the Likert scale questions will range from 0 (strongly disagree) to 4 (strongly agree). Individual ratings above 2 (neutral) should indicate that progress has been made in a particular area. Average ratings will also be computed for the combination of items pertaining to each SLO. An average rating above 2 (neutral) should indicate that the outcome has been met.  Our goal is to maintain or increase our effectiveness by meeting each outcome for at least 70% of our students.
